Lower Muskogee Creek Tribe Report: June 9, 2021

We are continuing to work on the Tribe's Aquaponics Project. We have just purchase 100 fingerling Catfish for tank number two. We have 2,400 cups in systems one and two.

Continuing to attend the Family First Prevention Webinars. These are highly informative sections.

Continuing to work with Fair Count. Setting appointments with the two new Senators and bringing them up on the Tribes in the State of Georgia and what our needs are.

Elders Council with the Natural Resource Conservation Services. This is the only Elders Council that is still in existence with USDA. There are many programs available. It is important That our people learn the process and time schedules for all these programs.

I am continuing to work with Four Directions on Civic issue. We are continuing to make sure our people are registered to vote, will have transportation, and understand the issues at hand.

We hosted 4 Elders from Muskogee Nation. They talked about the need to come to Georgia and connect with their ancestors. We sang in the Muskogee Language; they were curious about us and how we had survived over the years. I spoke to them about the East and the West needing to reconnect and they very much agreed. Dr. Bigpond had sent me two of his books and he had signed them. Each of them expressed that this would not be the last time they came to see me.

Next year for the National Day of Prayer we are planning for Lower Muskogee Creek Tribe, Muskogee Nation and two other Tribes to pray together for the event. We agreed that we would not allow the Eastern and Western Creek to be separate. They presented me with a ring that is an arrow. This would represent them on one end praying and me on the other end praying

We will be starting our Youth Council on Thursday, June 10th. This program will go all summer. We will meet each Thursday, Friday and Saturday. The children will arrive on Thursday by 4 pm and meet until 9 pm. On Friday they will come in at 8 am eating a light breakfast, have a short meeting concerning the day. They will be making gardening tools out of shell and wood handles, an axe out of a shell and will be planting tomatoes, beans and squash. (It is too late to plant corn in our area). The children will learn to finger weave sashes from yarn and weave a place mat or basket. We will be speaking Muskogee language to them the entire time. They will have language classes. Learning to play stick ball and making their own set of sticks. There will be a big camp feed every night that the parents will come to and then take the children to the Social Square to Stomp Dance and play stick ball.

I will be in Washington DC June 23 – 26. Will have meeting in the House and Senate and I will be speaking at the Buffalo Soldier Event.

I am writing to notify the Georgia Council on Indian Concerns of excavations in Dawson County by the University of North Georgia, Department of History, Anthropology, and Phi losophy. Dr. William Balco will be directing pedestrian survey, shovel test survey, and stratigraphic excavations using hand tools of no more than 100 square meters at 9DW276 (Rice Site) as part of UNG's Summer archaeology field school. Archaeological site 9DW276 is located on privately owned land and dates to the Middle Woodland to Mississippian Periods. Field work will take place from May 24 to June 25, 2021.

Dear Dr. Altman,

I am writing to notify the Georgia Council on Indian Concerns of the discovery of possible human remains on Saint Catherine's Island, Liberty County, Georgia by sea turtle researchers. The Georgia Office of the State Archaeologist was contacted by Sargent Cindy Miller with DNR Law Enforcement regarding a call she had received from Liberty County Sherriff's Detective Tracy Jennings regarding the discovery. The researcher indicated to Detective Jennings that he and his team had encountered a bone eroding from a sand bar while conducting a survey of sea turtle nesting sites on Saint Catherine's Island. Since Saint Catherine's is a privately owned island with an established archaeological program, the researcher notified "the archaeologists". Based in the location of the bone, not in an area with known burials, the archaeologists declined further involvement. The possible remains were secured in the archaeological facility on Saint Catherine's Island. Since the Saint Catherine's Island archaeologists declined involvement, the Georgia Office of the State Archaeologist recommended the Liberty County Sherriff's office confirm whether the remains are human and if this constitutes a forensics case. If the Council would like to pursue a different course of action, I am happy to facilitate that with the Liberty County Sherriff's Department.
